#### The Need for Mentoring

The support of mentorship can help children to build resilience and navigate adversity. When young people come to our program, they are often experiencing complex challenges in their day-to-day lives:

#### Big Steps to Success: Mentoring for Youth in Care

In addition to serving youth facing a variety of adversities, the Community Mentoring Program has a specific area of support for children involved with the child welfare system, living in care, or participating in a kinship agreement. Volunteer mentors selected for Big Steps to Success often have lived experience with the child welfare system and always receive additional training on the specific needs of youth in care.



## In-School Mentoring for Elementary Students

The In-School Mentoring program is designed to help increase students' self-esteem, resilience, and healthy attitudes toward school. Every school year, we see students grow in positive ways from the connections and fun they have with our mentors. It's mentoring magic!

Our program saw some challenges last year with staff recruitment and retention – however, despite those difficulties, our team were successfully able to create new matches. We would like to thank all those mentors, adults and teens alike, and school coordinators who stepped up to make a difference in childrens' lives.

#### **Program Outcomes: Supporting Growth**

Our survey data consistently tells us that children in need of support benefit throughout the school year and beyond from having a mentor at school. In 2023-24, mentors reported seeing their mentees grow:

#### **Group Outcomes: A Safe Space for Youth**

B You focuses on supporting youth through taking care of their bodies and minds. Female-identifying and gender-diverse youth, ages 9 to 15, meet at school once per week. After participating, youth felt more confident:

## Development, Grants, & Fundraising

As we conclude this fiscal year, the Development team initiated several projects to boost revenue. While grant revenue decreased by 17%, individual donations surged by 52%. For the first time, fundraising revenue surpassed Social Enterprise revenue. Our social return on investment is \$23 for every \$1 invested, reflecting the value of our work. On average, BBBSV generates \$23,317 in benefits per family, totaling over \$18 million this year. Your support is invaluable to us and the children and youth in our programs!

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, BBBSV generated **\$1.46 million** in revenue, mainly from social enterprise, grants, and donations. Despite increased fundraising, total expenses rose, leading to a **\$258,038** deficit. The organization aims to enhance cost control and revenue strategies for sustainable program growth.

## Development: New Projects & Initiatives

#### **Inclusive Meeting Space**

The **Victoria Foundation Community Grants Program** funded the renovation of our Inclusive Meeting Space, equipped for in-person and digital meetings. This safe and accessible room supports mentorship, training, and collaboration. We also offer the space for reservation at no cost to other local organizations, fostering closer relationships among non-profits, families, and communities in the region. Thank you to the **Victoria Foundation** for making these renovations and technological upgrades possible.



#### Human Resources Framework

Supported by the **Community Services Recovery Fund**, the project identified areas for improvement in human resources policies and compensation to align with organizational values. The project adapted to post-COVID challenges by creating an inclusive human resources framework. BBBSV revised its human resources manual, developed a new employee handbook, and updated the compensation model with leadership support. The Community Services Recovery Fund is a collaboration between the **Government of Canada**, the **Canadian Red Cross, Community Foundations of Canada**, and **United Way of Canada**.

#### **Gender-Diverse Mentoring**

BBBSV is enhancing gender-diverse mentoring by training staff and volunteers to support children with varying gender identities. Support from the **Community Foundations of Canada Equality Fund** enables better support, training, and attraction of role models for gender-diverse and 2SLGBTQIA+ youth. This project works to connect these youth with adult mentors who have lived experience or identify as 2SLGBTQIA+ themselves, helping young people to navigate their identities.

#### Youth Volunteering Study

Youth Volunteering: Looking Forward was a study of youth volunteering in the Victoria Capital Region. Initiated by **Volunteer Victoria**, the goal of the research project was to develop youth engagement models reflecting post-COVID realities. BBBSV conducted 75 youth interviews, established programming standards, and contributed to the project advisory committee. With this data, Volunteer Victoria can further develop programs and share insights to enhance volunteer opportunities for young people across the region.

#### **Smart Lighting: Illuminating Potential**

The Western Financial Group Communities Foundation funded our Smart Lighting project, which transformed our work and meeting spaces. New LED lighting lasts up to 20 times longer and uses significantly less energy than fluorescent lighting. In addition to using less energy and lowering costs, the new lights are sensory-friendly to improve accessibility for all staff, volunteers, and community members.

#### **Summer Contracts for Youth**

The **Canada Summer Jobs** wage subsidy program enables BBBSV to create quality summer work experiences for young people. Our youth contract position this year was a Business Development Associate, who worked with our organization to put together BBBS Month celebrations and develop our Open House event.



## Development: Fundraisers & Events

Our House of Distinction gala event was hosted on September 30, 2023. Over 200 guests gathered at the stunning home of Sissy Sapphire, a friend of BBBSV. We are so grateful to Sissy for opening her home to us and hosting our event. It was a spectacular evening of storytelling, food, and fun — not to mention live music and fine wine! # MOVE FOR MENTORING

## Social Enterprise Clothing Donation Centre

The Social Enterprise provides about 40% of Victoria Value Village's inventory through direct donations and daily deliveries via three trucks.

This year, the department adapted to meet revenue needs by participating in Scale Collaborative's Thriving Non-Profit cohort, exploring revenue diversification and strategic planning. In April 2024, we closed the makeshift marketplace from COVID-19, returning two rooms to our landlords and renovating our boardroom. Staff from the Marketplace shifted to our call center, leading to increased household donations.

## Social Enterprise: The Cycle of Donations



So what happens when you donate your used clothes? Donations of clothing, household goods, and small furniture items are dropped off at either our 230 Bay St. drop-off our at the **Value Village** Victoria location. Our partners, primarily Value Village, purchase these goods from us for resale. The revenue generated by this process is then invested into BBBSV mentoring programs, making up 49% of all funding in 2023-24.
